

# Lasting Harvest: February - May 2018

Hello everyone! This year has been moving along quite nicely here in Panama. We are excited to share with you what God has been doing these past few months.

### **Support Raising: Missions Festival**

In February, we flew to Atlanta to participate in one of our supporting church's week long Missions Festival. We were able to connect with individual supporters, as well as, meet new faces at the church and share with them about the work here in Panama. The week consisted of number of activities geared toward helping the church as a whole get to know their supported missionaries and the ministries they serve in around the world. Through a small group, Sunday school class, Men's prayer breakfast, and other activities through the week, we were able to share what God is doing in Panama through Lasting Harvest. We also had the opportunity to be encouraged through time with other missionaries sharing our stories and enjoying meals together. It was a very busy and exhausting week, but also encouraging and energizing at the same time. One of the highlights of the trip was hearing Ravi Zacharias preach the opening Sunday message. It was truly inspiring.

## **Demonstration Farm Development**

The first round of the year-long chicken breed yield verification trials came to a close with some very interesting results. We plan on continuing to trial other breeds and have now begun to use alternative diets with the goals of finding the most productive breed for growing in rural Panama, and the most profitable and feasible way to feed the chickens for the Ngobe. One interesting result from the first year of this trial is that the breed pushed most by the feed stores (where most rural Panamanians get their information about agricultural practices) is the least efficient meat producer of all the breeds that I have trialed to this point. It takes more than double the amount of feed to grow these birds compared to the most efficient in the trial. No wonder the feed stores encourage their production. Aside from the chicken yield verification trials over the last few months, farm development has been progressing slowly but surely. Funds are too low to buy many materials at the

progressing slowly but surely. Funds are too low to buy many materials at the moment so we have spent a lot of time on maintenance and repair like fixing the greenhouse roof. The little development of projects that we have been able to do has been using very basic materials. For example we are close to finishing a raceway for fish production using recycled pallets and pieces of plastic. This demonstration

is timely as we are so low on funds for materials and if it works, it will be a low cost demonstration that will be within reach of the rural poor around the world.

We also have made some progress on the dorms as funds allow. I am waiting to have the next Ngobe training program until the dorm kitchen is better set up because the first several training programs that we have had without the kitchen being more usable have been great

programs but difficult for feeding the students.

#### Other News

In other news, we are happy to announce we will be adding another member to our family in October. We are very excited and thankful for this new little one. Please keep Bethany and baby in your prayers. Bethany has had some minor health issues that have been stressed by pregnancy, so prayers for healing and continued health are very much appreciated.
